3. A match occurs if a family record is placed with all the persons in that family.

4. After the sorting has been completed all subfamily records in the same household are to follow the records of the primary family of that household then the subfamily "family" records are to be deleted completely from the file.

5. Note the files are probably already 99.9 percent in sort even before doing sorts #1 and #2. If this fact is not taken into account in the specifications the cost may be considerably higher.

The following substantive information will be useful to the writing of the specifications.

6. A household is uniquely identified by a PSU number and a schedule number. These numbers will be the same for all persons in the household and on the family records of all families in the household.

7. Each household will consist of a number of families. Even though the members of the household all have the same PSU number and schedule number the separate families can be identified by a unique PSU number, schedule number, type of family and family number, on the person records.
8. To match the person records with the family record, the type of family code can be used. If there are more than one type of family of a particular kind in the household the age of head (item 10 in the March person file, positions 33 and 34) and item 47, (position 87-88 in the family file) should be used to match the family record with the person records. If there is more than one head with the same age in the same type of family in the same household, (very unlikely) all of the records involved are to be written on tape for personal investigation. If a match cannot be made the unmatched records should also be written on tape.
9. The types of families are: Primary family, secondary family, family, primary individual, and secondary individual.
10. All persons in the family should have the same family number and family type. Each person-family record should be in sort by family relationship.
11. No household contains more than 32 persons or 20 families.
12. A description of the blocking of the tape and other tape specifications can be found in Micro Document #4.
