CURRENT POPULATION SURVEY, MAY 1979 (ICPSR 7974)

The Current Population Survey (CPS) is a household sample survey conducted monthly by the Bureau of the Census to provide estimates of employment, unemployment, and other characteristics of the general labor force, of the population as a whole and of various subgroups in the population. The entire non-institutionalized civilian population of the United States was sampled to obtain the respondents used for this survey. This file for May 1979 has 160,544 records, one for each of the persons 14 years old and over who were interviewed, and provides comprehensive data on the labor force activity of the respondents. Information is given concerning their employment status, occupation, and industry as well as personal characteristics such as age, sex, race, marital status, household relationship, educational background and Spanish origin, if applicable. Data are also provided for total family income, weekly earnings of the respondent, dual jobs and reasons for them, days and hours worked per week, earning per hour, union membership, and time of day at which work began and ended.

This file has approximately 500 variables. The data are available in logical record format, with 792 characters of information recorded for each of the survey respondents. Class IV

TYPE OF FILE:

Microdata; unit of observation is individuals within housing units.

UNIVERSE DESCRIPTION:

The universe consists of all persons in the civilian noninstitutional population of the United States living in sampled housing units. The probability sample selected to represent the universe consists of approximately 76,700 households. Persons age 14 years old and over have an adult record; children age 0 to 13 have a child record.

SUBJECT-MATTER DESCRIPTION:

Data are provided on labor force activity for the week prior to the survey. Comprehensive data are available on the employment status, occupation, and industry of persons 14 years old and over. Also shown are personal characteristics such as age, sex, race, marital status, veteran status, household relationship, educational background, and Spanish origin.

Additional statistics show total family income, work schedule, number of days and hours usually worked, usual weekly or hourly earnings, premium pay, reasons for dual jobholding, and union membership. Also furnished are data on pension plan coverage, employee contribution, and pension provisions made by the self-employed.

This file also contains matched data from the March and June, 1979 surveys. Records for individuals in the four rotations common to March and May (May month in sample 3, 4, 7, and 8) include the income and work experience data from the March CPS. June 1979 earnings, collected for the two outgoing rotations in that month (May month in sample 3 and 7) are included on the appropriate records.

GEOGRAPHIC COVERAGE:

All States and 44 SMSA's are identified and ranked by population size (1970). Central city/noncentral city indicators are provided for the largest SMSA's.
